Commas

Commas

are used to separate words and groups of words so that they are easier to read and understand.

We use Commas

- 1. Before coordinating conjunctions
- 2. To separate words in a series

Commas before coordinating conjunctions.

We use a comma before coordinating conjunctions: and, or, but to separate a compound sentence.

Example:

- 1. I packed my backpack, *and* mom put it in the car.
- 2. We tried to visit the zoo, **but** it was closed.

Coordinating Conjunction

Commas are used in a series of words.

Three more words written one after another are called a **series**.

Commas are used to separate the words in the series. Coordinating conjunction and, or are often used in a series.

Example:

1. I drew a picture of the mountains, sun, and clouds.



2. I ate a hotdog, potato salad, and corn.
